What to do?

Top things to do in Vladivostok

- Take photos of the city's symbols – the Golden Bridge over Golden Horn Bay and the Russky Bridge
- View the city and its bridges from an observation deck – either Eagle's Nest Hill or Burachka Hill
- Walk along the Korabelnaya Embankment, explore the naval memorial complex, and continue along the Tsesarevich Embankment
- Take a boat ride around Vladivostok's bays, try stand-up paddleboarding or even surfing
- Board the S-56 submarine, or the frigates Pallada and Nadezhda with a guided tour
- Stroll along Admiral Fokin Street – the "Vladivostok Arbat" – or Svetlanskaya Street, with its bars and restaurants
- Explore the colorful and contrasting Millionka quarter – Russia's first Chinatown.
- Swim at one of the local beaches, such as near the Tokarevsky Lighthouse beach
- Discover the world of plants at the Botanical Garden of the Far Eastern Branch of the Russian Academy of Sciences
- Learn about the history of the Russian Far East at the V.K. Arsenyev Museum
- View works by local and international artists at the Primorye State Art Gallery
- Attend a performance at the Primorsky Stage of the Mariinsky Theatre
- Relive childhood memories at the Vladivostok Circus

Top things to do outside Vladivostok

- Enjoy the natural beauty of Russky Island and Cape Tobizina
- Visit the Primorsky Oceanarium – the fourth largest in the world
- Take a sea tour to explore nearby islands, bays, and capes around Vladivostok
- Relax on Shamora Beach – Vladivostok's most famous beach in Lazurnaya Bay (28 km away), or on Glass Bay Beach
- See animals up close and in a cage-free environment at the Safari Park
- Watch seals, sea lions, and even whales in their natural habitat
- Go on a photo safari to discover local lighthouses
